Four distinguished California leaders will be honored at the 3rd Annual NAACP ACT-SO Qwards Luncheon, April 14 in Los Angeles.

The Luncheon is hosted by the Regional Office of the NAACP. Awards will also be presented to local high school students for outstanding academic achievement.

founded five years ago by Chicago Tribune Columnist Vernon Jarrett, to honor youthful school scholars, scientists and artists. The winners at the national competition will win prizes of \$1,000, \$750 and \$500.

Proceeds from the \$75-a-plate luncheon will enable the Southern California high school students who receive the ACT-SO Awards to participate in national competition at the 73rd NAACP Annual Convention this June in Boston, MA.

In 1981, the NAACP West Coast Region entered 72 contestants, with 11 becoming finalists. These finalist won \$9,000 in scholarships.

Construction of the 20,000 square foot center is scheduled to begin this fall, with a Spring, 1972 completion date. The shopping center derives its name from its location which is across from USC.

Ground has been broken for the first new shopping facilities to be built along Vermont Ave. in the Hoover Redevelopment Project according to Community Redevelopment Agency officials.

Named "Campus Center," the junior-size shorping center is valued at approximately a half-million dollars. It will contain approximately 20,000 square feet of commercial space and will include a market, restaurant and related retail facilities.

The site, a 1.5-acre parcel, is on Vermont Ave., between 36th St., and 36th Pl., near the USC campus. Prior to redevelopment, the area previously contained a collection of small retail businesses, congested together on the old "Vermont Strip."

Under a participation agreement recently approved by the Community Redevolpment Agency board, "Campus Center" will be developed by a community-based local development company.
